Connecting with the People's University for Palestine

On Sunday, July 13th, James visited us for a forum on the People's University for Palestine here in San Antonio. We learned how the People's University formed last year after Governor Abbott's Executive Order 44 targeted pro-Palestine students, educators, and campus organizations. At the same time, the schools and universities in Gaza were being destroyed. Professors, students, and community members came together and imagined a university outside of school walls and censorship that would center Palestinian voices and oppose systemic violence.

Throughout fall 2024 and spring 2025, the People's University met about once per month on Zoom or at different locations in the community to discuss topics such as militarism, religious nationalism, colonization, and the Boycott, Divest, and Sanctions movement, always demonstrating the connections between Palestine and San Antonio.

Query for August

Do we care for one another so deeply that we are aware of the personal difficulties of those in the meeting community? How do we translate our awareness of those difficulties into appropriate action? How do we express our concern for others when we feel a problem exists and our help has not been sought?

Another strong throughline in these sessions has been poetry. James led us to reflect on the <u>poem</u> "Your Weight, at Birth" by Naomi Shibab Nye, a Palestinian poet in San Antonio.

James graciously shared with us his path to becoming an educator and his path to becoming involved in the struggle for justice in historic Palestine. Both interests were first sparked by his love for the environment. He now sees connections everywhere; so many of the social concerns we face here in San Antonio are also key elements of the Palestinian struggle. He encouraged us to keep our focus on the ongoing genocide in Gaza and how we can support Palestinians in seeking peace and justice.

At Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business on July 20th, Lisa proposed inviting the People's University to hold one of their sessions on our property. What followed was a rich discussion of what we are led to do with the resources we have. Friends expressed our alignment with the People's University's principles and deep concern about the targeting of educational efforts in this country and possible future erosion of free speech protections.

We united in the following minute:

MINUTE 2025.07.03 FMSA supports the mission of education and justice of the People's University for Palestine and, in that spirit, approves offering our space for free to hold a meeting in the fall or spring semester, should they require additional space.

Other Groups Use Our Meetinghouse

- 1. Some groups rent only the Meeting Room or the Community Room. Friends are welcome to use other parts of the Meetinghouse while they are here, but should stay away from the Meeting/Community rooms and the main porch. It is fine to use the library or work in the gardens.
 - These rentals have the off-blue color code for "Outside Groups" on our website calendar.
- 2. Other groups rent the entire site for private events. Unless you are involved with that group, Friends should NOT come to the Meetinghouse during their activities.
 - These rentals have the light-yellow color code for "Private Events" on our website calendar.

We need to be courteous to these groups and not impinge on their activities. Friends are welcome to come to the Meetinghouse during the week, but should consult the website calendar (https://sanantonioquakers.org/calendar/) before doing so.

A Quaker advocacy group that lobbies Congress to promote peace, justice, and environmental stewardship based on Quaker values.

American Friends Service Committee (AFSC)

A Quaker organization working globally for peace, human rights, and social justice through humanitarian aid, advocacy, and education.

Friends Journal

Last Contribution \$75 in 2024

A monthly Quaker magazine that explores contemporary issues through the lens of Quaker faith and practice.
