AFSC Staff Member Injured in Gaza

Friends who attended South Central Yearly Meeting this year may remember the American Friends Service Committee workshop on their work in Gaza. We heard from their two staff members, Firas and Serena, through Zoom. They shared about their struggle to feed themselves and other Palestinians amidst bombings, displacement, and a blockade of humanitarian aid. They were so generous in sharing their time and experiences with us.

I received the news on June 24th that Firas was injured in a bombing that killed his neighbor. I am very concerned about his prospects for recovery given the destruction of the healthcare system in Gaza.

It is easy to feel hopeless in the face of so much suffering. We may never know whether our words and actions made an impact. As we hold that, what are we called to do? I invite Friends to think of one action they can take this week for Gaza in Firas's honor.

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Query for July

In times of public protest, when injustice demands a response and violence threatens to rise—within us or around us—how do we remain faithful to the Spirit of peace and stay guided by love, not hatred?

We will not be collecting physical donations on the first Sunday in July for the community we are supporting. We will resume collections in August; check the weekly announcements for details about what is needed.



Reflections on Friends Journal

The features in May's Friends Journal focused on housing and homelessness. The first feature, *The Coldest Night at the Overflow Shelter*, was a meditative piece describing one night when the author volunteered at a shelter in Missouri. The second feature, *I Was a Stranger and You Invited Me In*, described what happened when a small meeting in Ohio viewed Matthew 25:35-36 as a to-do list, experimenting with ways to let in a stranger, including inviting an unhoused person to live in a camper on their property and outfitting a retired ambulance as a camper to give to an unhoused woman.


The third feature focused on a laundry ministry in San Francisco for which the author sat outside the San Francisco Meetinghouse on Sundays during worship to extend "spiritual care in the form of laundry." The author reminded friends that "neither understanding nor being comfortable are baselines for good order: the central question is whether we are being faithful," and he suggested that the dominant monthly meeting culture (which is often White and middle-class) sometimes takes precedence over discernment.

The fourth feature felt like the meat and potatoes of this issue (or tofu and rice if you're a vegetarian). Shalom and Right Relationship: Reflections on Housing Justice provided statistics on housing and homelessness as well as context to help readers understand the nature and some of the dynamics of the housing crisis in the United States. The author also suggested that we deepen our thinking about housing justice to include the Quaker concept of right relationship. The article concluded with specific suggestions for pursuing housing justice and provided resources to support further research.

The final feature, *Solidarity with Our Unhoused Neighbors: Quaker Ministries for the Homeless*, described ministries for unhoused people in several communities in California, including parking for unhoused people living in cars, first aid, talking with unhoused people to really understand their needs and to include them in community, and providing children's activities in shelters.

As I read these articles, I thought about our recent forum, where the pastor of a local community shared with us her work with homeless immigrants, who Haven For Hope and the Salvation Army are turning away out of fear of losing federal funding. I am glad FMSA is supporting her financially and with donations of food, clothes, and whatever else is needed. Opportunities to give as a community make the often overwhelming desire to help feel as simple as buying rice and oil at HEB, and meeting the person who distributes our donations helped me believe that every little donation makes a meaningful difference.
