Reflections on Friends Journal

The August issue of the Friends Journal featured six lessons from history. *Black Resistance to Quaker Enslavement* told another side of the story of Quaker abolition, which includes the role that Black resistance played in forcing the Religious Society of Friends to confront its own contradictions and ultimately recognize that of God in enslaved people.

The Burning of Pennsylvania Hall recounted the brief existence of a "temple to free discussion" built by abolitionists in 1838 and destroyed two weeks later by a mob enraged by the "race-mixing" and "women and men speaking together equally" that went on inside. This article puts our current struggles over DEI in a larger context in which the progress we have made makes me feel hopeful.

Led by God to Help Educate Freedmen celebrates the history of the Laing School, which was founded in 1866 by Quakers to educate newly freed slaves in South Carolina. A Fine Union of Serenity and Adventure tells the story of how Rufus Jones "recovered his lost radiance," moving from an abstract faith to a life-changing feeling of unconditional acceptance from the divine.

Quaker Witnessing During Philadelphia's MOVE Crisis tells the shocking story of the bombing of a residential building in Philadelphia that was home to MOVE, a Black liberation and back-to-nature organization, and it explores how peacekeeping quietly normalized the power and violence of racism because its practitioners failed to acknowledge the racial dimensions of the situation.

The final article, A Union Unlike Any Other, explored the shifting views of U.S. Quakers on same-sex marriage. Because I am very aware that equality for LGBTQ+ Friends is still not a foregone conclusion, this article reminded me that each of the articles in this Friends Journal captures a point in time. All of these histories are still unfolding. What will the Friends of the future write about us?
