What We Are Swimming In

On July 27th, Friends gathered for a forum on white culture in Quakerism. Friends identified times they experienced cultural differences or alignment. Some Friends struggled to name characteristics of white culture, as it is often seen as the default in the United States, inside and outside Quaker spaces. Friends concluded that this invisibility allows white culture to maintain its dominance without being questioned.

Friends reflected on times that white culture shaped Quaker spaces they have been a part of, from decision-making practices centering Western nonprofit-style accounting to our own meeting time that favors middle-class work schedules. Friends explored how different approaches to change could challenge or uphold white cultural assumptions.

If we really believe in continuing revelation, do we have to continue practices just because they are what we have always done?

Reflections on Friends Journal

The June/July issue of the Friends Journal was a meditation on Quaker revivals. In six features, authors from around the world shared their thoughts and experiences. In Breaking the Old Rules, a Friend from London shared her meeting's discovery that by asking less of any one person, more people became willing to serve, which made their meeting more sustainable. In Big Steps for Small Friends in First-Day School, our very own Suzanne Cole Sullivan shared how a tiny spark of revival is being ignited for young Friends in First-Day School at FMSA. In Risking Faithfulness, the author described a process of experimentation that opens meetings up to renewal, recognizing that we must change and grow to stay healthy. In Coming Out from Under Our Bushel, the author discussed the history of revival in Quakerism and noted that although Friends are hesitant to push our beliefs on others, many might find our beliefs and practices meaningful, especially in light of the challenges facing our world today. In The Revival of Defiance and the Call to Repair, the author presented the role of defiance in early Quaker life and argued that defiance, grounded in core values and ethical commitment, is necessary for revival. Finally, an interview with Paul Buckley, author of Primitive Quakerism Revived, let us eavesdrop on a conversation about why a Quaker revival is needed, not just now, but continually.

Quaker Witness to the Wounds of Gaza

"Today, the word "occupation" no longer carries its old meaning; occupation, despite its atrocity, kept people under restraint. What we see today is extermination and erasure from the map. It is not occupation but replacement, replacing a whole life with nothingness, and the memory of a city with ruin...

I write here to bear witness, and history bears witness with me: we are the children of a generation destined to live through the most terrible tragedies of humanity in the last hundred years.

O you who pass by our story... do not be mere spectators. Record that you are witnesses to the wound, witnesses before God and before the memory of humanity."

-Firas, American Friends Service Committee Gaza office manager, 8.20.25 (translated)

Eight Quaker organizations joined together in their witness to the ongoing reality of Gaza, excerpted here:

"We believe with moral clarity, and in line with the definition of the crime of genocide, that the current actions in Gaza perpetrated by the Israeli government, constitute Genocide...

All states have a legal duty under the Genocide Convention to prevent genocide. We call for:

- 1. An immediate, permanent ceasefire and full humanitarian access
- 2. The application of robust, targeted, and timebound sanctions, including a comprehensive arms embargo, aimed at ending Israel's genocide in Gaza and therelated system of apartheid.
- 3. Respect for international law and accountability
- 4. Protection of free speech and the right to protest
- 5. Dismantling of oppression and establishing a just and permanent peace

As Quaker signatories, we commit to:

- Advocate relentlessly for the end of the Israeli genocide in Gaza and the deliberate starvation campaign, a permanent ceasefire and accountability for atrocities committed in Gaza, the West Bank and East Jerusalem.
- Boycott settlement goods and divest from companies profiting from occupation, apartheid, or genocide (e.g., arms manufacturers, settlement financiers).
- Reach out in love to Jewish, Muslim and Palestinian communities, confronting antisemitism, anti-Muslim and anti-Palestinian hate while refusing to be silent in the face of oppression.
- Highlight the voices of Palestinians, which have still been all-too-absent from media narratives.
- Support humanitarian relief for Gaza and communities suffering under occupation in the West Bank.
- Advocate for the universal human rights of all people in Palestine and Israel—ensuring they can live in freedom and dignity, without fear, and with lasting peace and security.

We hold in the Light all suffering peoples and leaders, praying they choose justice. In Palestine and Israel, peace built on equality is the only path forward.
